Join us October 30 - November 1, 2020, in Santa Fe, New Mexico for the 17th annual National Federation of State Poetry Societies "<u>Power of Words</u>" <u>Conference</u>: Transformation, Liberation and Celebration Through the Spoken, Written, and Sung Word.

Featuring U.S. Poet Laureate <u>Joy Harjo</u> as conference keynoter, the conference will take place at the <u>El Dorado Hotel & Spa</u>, in the heart of Santa Fe. The El Dorado is ranked one of Condé Nast Traveler Readers' Choice top 10 hotels.

The conference fee is a modest increase over the 2019 registration fee, but it includes all meals, refreshments, and facilities fees (which were previously part of the meals and lodging package). Craft Talk

This ongoing column provides tips and information about the craft of writing poetry. In this new series, we are sharing the **Top 10 Tips for Poetry Submissions** from Alan Perry - Senior Poetry Editor, *Typehouse Literary Magazine*.

1. Follow Submission Guidelines

This is one of the most frequently cited areas for poetry editors to reject a submission. If the journal has specific guidelines (which most do), follow them exactly. These guidelines can include a deadline for submission, maximum number of lines per poem, a word count maximum in your bio, the maximum number of poems to submit, and others. Read all submission guidelines for each journal thoroughly and don't miss any details that might be required. (Note: I once saw one journal that "tested" its submitters by burying a code deep in its submission guidelines to see if the poet would actually read all the rules and include the code in his/her cover letter!).

Any number of poems may be entered in each category, but each individual poem may be submitted only once per entire contest. All entries need not be sent in at one time. Submissions without fees will be disqualified.

MAILED ENTRIES: Each poem must have the following information <u>in the Upper Right Corner</u>: Category # and Title of Category. See sample below .

DO NOT PUT YOUR NAME OR ANY IDENTIFYING INFORMATION ON YOUR POEM!

1. **FORMAT**: Submit one clearly-typed copy of each poem (in English only), on 8-1/2"x11" white paper, without lines/no illustrations. Submit each poem on a separate page; no staples, unless an individual poem exceeds one page.

For consistency, poems should be submitted in Times New Roman 12.

Spaces or breaks between stanzas will not count as a line. Spaces or breaks for effect only will be counted as lines. Introductory or editorial remarks, quotations, epigraphs, dedications, etc. will be included in the total line count.

2. INCLUDE A PAGE LISTING POEM NAMES WITH THE FIRST LINE (We insist on the first line!) AND YOUR NAME, ADDRESS, EMAIL, & PHONE NUMBER.


