Craft Talk – About Poetry

This ongoing column provides tips and information about the craft of writing poetry. In this edition, we are serializing an article from a workshop presented by Tucson Poetry Society member, Frank Iosue, on the subject of "Revising Poetry – Poetic Creation, Criticism and Revision."

- 1. Poetry is art and artifice, first and foremost --- The poem is an arena of **assembled** apprehensions and associations; a "psychic ecosystem" **bounded, ordered and amplified** through craft and language.
- 2. Poetry is exposition, not explanation.
- 3. The poem is its own reality / entity. A separate, elevated, intensification of feeling and expression. An autonomous "identity" connected to, but distinct from, the artist who creates it.

Next quarter: Elements of Creation; Criticism and Evaluation.
