CHRISTY'S CORNER

I hope all of you are finding that your poetry, and the poems of others, helps you make your way through our current crises. I have become a dedicated Zoomie, attending workshops, readings, even a poetry conference. These times have thrust many of us into learning and using more electronics to connect with family, friends and other poets, while leaving others of us sidelined. In the last Zoom meeting of the Mustang Poets, I was pleased to welcome back one of our elders that I had not seen since March. She was assisted by another of our elders and a former president of ASPS, all with safe distancing!

One of the poets I have been reading lately is Matthew Zapruder and his book, <u>WHY Poetry</u>, published in 2017. It is a wonderful, affirming read, and his Afterword addresses much about the importance of poets and their poetry in times like these. "To be continually surrounded by language used exclusively for utilitarian purposes is a threat to the disinterested yet sacred attention a poet must have to words. Also, poetry has an intimate, necessary relation with silence. The work of poets is impaired by too much noise and language, a scarcity of silence."

If you live alone, like I do, you have moments of silence punctuated by the hum of the refrigerator, the soft snore of a dog (or a cat, they sometimes snore too!), or someone walking by your front door. Even if you are living with someone, or someones, you may still find the silent moments. With the strictures of safe distancing, staying at home, being safe, human contact has diminished, and as poets we may find that silence is more important than ever to the very real work of language creation. But the poetry comes through the silence of our minds, and that may be harder to achieve.

Settling down our minds, turning off the electronic burblings of the computer, the TV, and our phones is essential to allowing our poetry to rise up. I mean that in a very real sense of writing poetry that causes others, not just ourselves, to lift up from the malaise of confusion and loss, to find their own silence because you found yours.

I wish you well, I wish you safe, I wish you healthy, I wish you creativity, and most of all, I wish you that your silence is punctuated by a pen or pencil on paper, or the tapping of a keyboard. I look forward to reading and hearing your poems.

ASPS 2021 Dues

It is time to send in your 2021 annual dues for ASPS and for the Branch in which you participate/identify. ASPS dues are \$25/year and Branch dues vary for each branch, though most are \$5/year. Youth membership, a new category for ages 13-18, is \$5/year.

You can submit the total payment of both dues by:

Craft Talk

This ongoing column provides tips and information about the craft of writing poetry. In this new series, we are sharing the **Top 10 Tips for Poetry Submissions** from Alan Perry - Senior Poetry Editor, *Typehouse Literary Magazine*.

Tip #2: Prioritize

After you've done your research, it's time for the next important step of prioritization. This should occur in two ways:

- A. **Prioritize the journals to which you want to submit.** Many poet instructors recommend sorting your desired journals into three tiers - A, B and C. The A journals can be top-tier journals by whom you would love to be accepted. While these might be a stretch, they can represent a goal for which your writing can aspire. The B journals can be solid and well known, but be more achievable goals for your writing, and can represent a realistic goal. The C-level represents journals that have a higher acceptance rate than average, and may be a good source for getting some of your work initially published, especially if you are just starting out.
- B. **Prioritize your poems.** This requires you to assess the levels of depth, humanity, imagery, cohesiveness, structure, etc., of each of the poems that you want to submit. Again, you should be grouping your poems into categories that represent your top tier of work, your middle level work, and other work that still requires significant revision before it's ready to submit to a journal you like.


