# **ASPS President's Posting**

Editing your own poetry is not always easy. There are several valid reasons for not editing your poems, but I have learned that most of my poems get better with editing.

My first edit is usually when I transfer the poem from the page to the computer. These are major edits that almost all of us will do, but if I want to go further and work toward a really good poem, I take it to my poetry groups with the intent of improving the poem.

It's been said more than once that if we want to be writers, we should develop thick skins so that any criticism of our work doesn't stop us. But more than that, we have to really pay attention to what we are being told. The members of our poetry groups are not saying something to hurt you, but they may not know how to say it well.

Here are my soft rules for group editing of any writing:

- 1 Read your poem aloud, try to provide everyone a copy of the poem for notes.
- 2 The group tells you what works well in the po-
- 3 The group tells you what doesn't work so well in the poem.
- 4 You take notes and listen, answer any questions thoughtfully, and don't get upset because the criticism isn't about you.
- 5 Thank the group for their feedback.
- 6 Give the poem and the notes some resting time before you work on it again - unless you are fired up and want to work on it right away.
- 7 You don't have to apply any of it, ever.

I hope my comments help your poems become the works of art you want them to be!

# **Craft Talk – About Poetry**

This ongoing column provides tips and information about the craft of writing poetry. In this edition, we are serializing an article from a workshop presented by Tucson Poetry Society member Frank Iosue on the subject of "Revising Poetry – Poetic Creation, Criticism and Revision."

There are no absolutes...judgment is relative...influenced by experience, bias, preference, knowledge, ego and other existential baggage. But, if these aspects are merged with an informed standard of discrimination, predicated on the elements and contexts of the work itself, a critical appraisal and assessment will be more beneficial and fulfilling to the creation/revision process than an arbitrary, or less-definable, aesthetic value system based merely on fashion, compulsion or whim.

Standards of critical appraisal, revision, creative strategies, aesthetic objectives and calculated manipulations should be applied to meet the unique "demands" of each poem...and evolve to serve those "demands" as each poem evolves.

# NFSPS 2019 Convention Reflections by Eva Willis

I've been to the mountain and I'm back. I was fortunate to attend the NFSPS diamond jubilee convention in Santa Fe. Since this was my introduction to poetry conventions, I was unsure what to expect. What I found was a well-organized event with some friendly poets, good food, pleasant surroundings and venues, and a trip back to a city I enjoy. The New Mexico State Poetry Society worked diligently to plan and conduct an interesting event, man registration and the bookstore, and try to anticipate all our needs. I never saw anyone else with Arizona on their lanyard, so I may have been our state's only representative.

There was time to explore and enjoy the wonders of Santa Fe, the city different and oldest U.S. state capital. There were nine workshops; I attended three. Sunday night we were entertained by a cowboy singer and poet. Monday morning at the opening ceremony, the mayor spoke and read an official proclamation naming the week "a capital week for poetry". We were all allowed to choose a handmade tote from a wide variety of designs and colors. Each of us received *Encore*, with the top 150 prize-winning poems read and awarded at the 2018 convention held in Denver. There were opportunities to be introspective as well as sociable. There was time to write and also share poetry at open mics and one evening of street corner poetry near the city plaza. There was an entire afternoon in the state capitol rotunda to listen to BlackBerry Peach prize poems. A bonus was the building's four floors of beautiful artwork and a special fabric art installation on the ground floor.

I thoroughly enjoyed myself and spent much time outdoors enjoying the 85 degree weather. I hope some of you will be able to attend a convention. Next year's location has not yet been decided.



Congratulations to **Joy Harjo** on being named our nation's newest poet Laureate and first ever Native American to receive this honor! Harjo was elected an Academy of American Poets Chancellor earlier this year and received the Academy's Wallace Stevens Award for proven mastery in the art of poetry in 2015. As a poet, a teacher, and

a literary leader, Joy Harjo has touched many lives and many communities. She now has what is one of the largest platforms a poet can aspire to and it is a well-deserved honor. We're thrilled for Joy and for the nation on this historic appointment.

ELIGIBILITY: Open to all

QUALIFICATIONS: Original, unpublished poems not currently submitted to other contest(s). Any number of poems may be entered in each category, but each individual poem may be submitted only once per entire contest. All entries need not be sent in at one time. Submissions without fees will be disqualified.

MAILED ENTRIES: Each poem must have the following information in the Upper Right Corner: Category # and Title of Category. See sample below.

## DO NOT PUT YOUR NAME OR ANY IDENTIFYING INFORMATION ON YOUR POEM!

1. FORMAT: Submit one clearly-typed copy of each poem (in English only), on 8-1/2"x11" white paper, without lines/no illustrations. Submit each poem on a separate page; no staples, unless an individual poem exceeds one page.

Spaces or breaks between stanzas will not count as a line. Spaces or breaks for effect only will be counted as lines. Introductory or editorial remarks, quotations, dedications, etc. will be included in the total line count.

2. INCLUDE A PAGE LISTING POEM NAMES WITH THE FIRST LINE (We insist on the first line! Please!) AND YOUR NAME, ADDRESS, EMAIL, & PHONE NUMBER.
