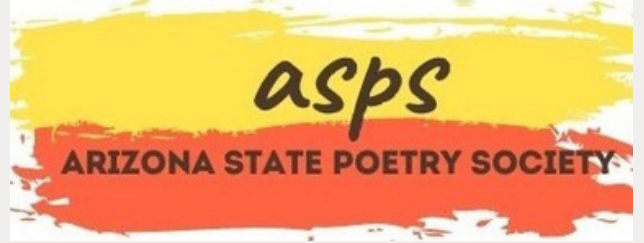

David R. Davis, author of *Running In, Walking Out*, *The Unusual Man*, *And the Sun Will Rise*, and *Cardboard Heroes*, grew up in Texas and now lives in sunny Green Valley, Arizona. A former medic with the 101 st Airborne Division in Vietnam, he later spent thirty years as a social worker, therapist, and administrator. He has written two chapbooks of poetry, *Finding Home* and *A Brief Moment Called Life*, along with *Mutt Monologues*, a humorous chapbook about dogs. David writes with a simple hope: that readers will pause, think, and feel something real. His writing tag, “Read to Think and Feel,” is less a slogan than an invitation. When he is not writing, he is usually supervised by his two rescue dogs, Denni and Max. What connects his books, poems, humor, and life experience is a steady interest in what people carry, what they survive, and what they discover about themselves along the way.

Elizabeth Jaeger

Elizabeth Jaeger is an associate professor emerita in the Department of Teaching, Learning, and Sociocultural Studies at the University of Arizona. Dr. Jaeger’s scholarship includes two strands. She considers the role of a range of eco-system elements—from texts to tasks to peer relationships to macro-system factors of class, race, and gender—in the experience of students for whom the process of coming to literacy has not been easy. Dr. Jaeger also explores those who write for personal fulfillment. Recent studies involved elementary students in an after-school Writing Workshop and adults with major mental illness who are members of a writing group at a local psych-social service center. Upcoming research will examine the writing practices of other volitional writers. Dr. Jaeger’s service work focuses on human rights, particularly for those who are incarcerated.



Parking Instructions

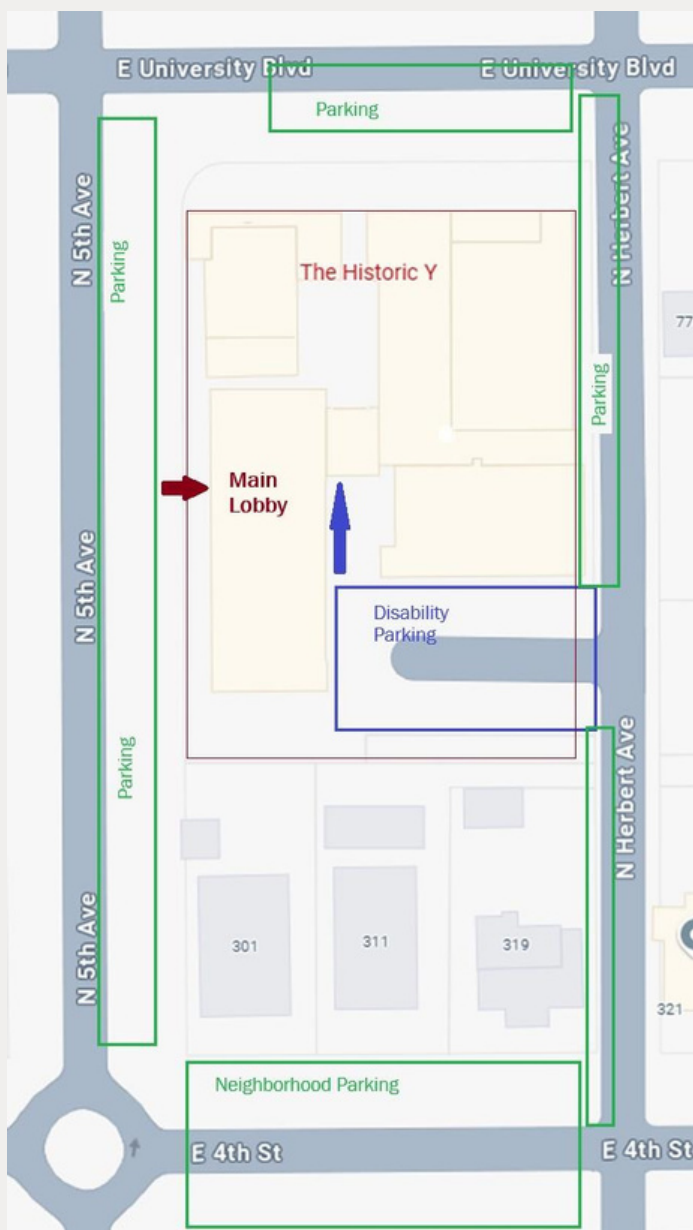
Refer to Image Below for these instructions.



Disability Parking is available in the blue box area accessible off N. Herbert St. The blue arrow indicates the ramp access.



Green boxes indicate parking areas. During the time of our event, the parking restrictions on the signs will not apply.



A single line of parking is available along the wall on N Herbert Ave.

Neighborhood parking is available on E 4th Street – please be mindful to park in open areas only.

Disability access is also available at the main entrance, but the parking on the street is not as convenient as in the blue box area.

Parking is challenging at best, but this map will help. Be patient and drive around the block to find parking.

The dark red arrow indicates the main entrance.
